Interview with the Director



Stephen Kadenyo, Executive Director, explains in an interview how Pamoja meets the needs of disadvantaged people, while assuring quality project management and sustainable growth.

Which highlights did you experience in 2016 as Executive Director?

2016 saw major progress in bringing life-changing programs to disadvantaged rural and urban communities in Kenya. We worked in six counties and supported over 1'500 women, men and young people by enabling them to access knowledge, skills, networks and business and financial services.

What constituted an emotional challenge for you this year in particular?

We began implementing a new framework for preventing violence against women and girls. Young girls who were physically and sexually abused showed the courage to speak up. Listening to their stories was particularly moving. Our efforts to build safe spaces for them at schools, strengthening relationships between school, community and police showed first fruits. The police are now part of our school mentorship program.

Pamoja has grown substantially in the last year. What has been the growth strategy?

Growth in itself is not our aim. Our goal is to give disadvantaged people the opportunity to improve their lives through their own efforts. To this end, we aim at reaching quality and sustainable growth. The success of the programs is

based on the professionalism, ingenuity and hard work of our team and partners.

What were the main challenges?

Most of our beneficiaries are either illiterate or semi illiterate making the passing of education and information resource intensive. Harsh geographical terrain hampered access to our beneficiaries in remote rural areas. Limited resources against the overwhelming demand for our activities and need within the communities pose a challenge and Pamoja has only a small team to coordinate all its activities. We however managed to sail through against these odds.

What can we expect in the year 2017?

In 2017 we will invest in three priority areas that will amplify our impact on the communities and further improve our program quality:

- Investing in building strong and sustainable networks to scale up impact
- Sharing knowledge with partners who can then replicate our most successful programs
- Develop a robust monitoring and results measurement system to demonstrate the relevance and effectiveness of our activities

We would like to position Pamoja as an organization capable of achieving sustainable impact, even in difficult contexts.

The social problem

Violent conflicts and lack of economic opportunities

Violent conflicts

Key drivers of conflicts in Kenya are community identities and cultural rivalry, issues of land and natural resources, political activities, historical grievances, radicalization and a challenging regional environment.



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Lack of economic opportunities

Disadvantaged communities lack access to knowledge, skills and financial services to become economically active and stable. This leads to unemployment, poverty and exploitation.



Pamoja's strategy

Our strategy to tackle violence and poverty

Pamoja supports communities affected by conflict with resources and tools to move from crisis and poverty to peace and development. We serve the marginalized and disadvantaged communities in Kenya and Eastern Africa including women, children, the youth as well as rural and urban communities. Pamoja takes a holistic approach to development by linking the three areas of peace promotion / conflict management, economic development and community development.

Monitoring & Results Measurement

As a learning organization, Pamoja is keen to find out precisely what impact its projects have. This enables Pamoja to learn from success and failure, plan future projects better and show accountability to the communities it serves as well as to partners and donors. Pamoja learns from its daily work in different ways, for instance by regular review and reflection forums to assess what went well and what could be done better.

Over the past year, Pamoja has been working on building a monitoring and results measurement (MRM) system into its projects. This system measures qualitative and quantitative indicators, covering outputs, outcomes, impact, partners and efficiency. Pamoja received technical support and advise to develop a MRM framework from external MRM advisors, including **Kimon Schneider**. Pamoja's partner organization **Act Change Transform (ACT!)**, supported a training workshop in Monitoring, Evaluation Learning and Reporting. We thank them sincerely for leading us to a higher level of tracking impact.

In 2017, Pamoja will work towards aligning its MRM framework to global good-practice standards, such as the Donor Committee on Enterprise Development (DCED) Standards.



Stories of Change

"Boda boda rider" turned women's rights activist and fights violence

Armstrong Mwangala Mwaveka was the leader of the "boda boda" taxi drivers - a crimeassociated activity - and now serves as one of Pamoja's Voluntary Safety Coordinators to help prevent violence against women and girls in Kilifi.

"It is incredible how much things have changed through Pamoja's program. I now have fellow champions including police, teachers, youth and social workers to combat violence. These networks are crucial to handle cases successfully."

Armstrong Mwangala Mwaveka is 48 years old and the leader of the motorcycle taxi drivers, the so called "boda boda riders" in Mtwapa, Kilifi County. Boda boda business in Kenya is known for being associated with crime and gang activities. For example, young school girls are forced by boda body drivers into sexual intercourse in exchange for the transport services.

Armstrong was often confronted with cases of rape, domestic violence and early marriages, cutting across his own group members as either victims or perpetrators. Despite his strong influence over the boda boda in Mtawapa, Armstrong felt helpless, since he did not have the prerequisite knowledge, skills and linkages to enable him intervene to the needy cases.

ARMSTRONG ON THE PROGRAM IMPACT:

Changed attitudes and behavior towards violence

"I acquired knowledge and skills to respond non-violently to conflicts. Pamoja's trainings transformed my interaction with my children, wife and community."

Improved collaboration with the police

"Thanks to Pamoja's forums, which bring together community leaders and state actors, I have direct contacts with the police. I now can effectively refer cases for response and make follow-ups too."

Effective victim support services

"Previously, I have received 1-3 cases of violence in a day with minimal success in finding a solution. Now I interact with up to 10 cases a day. Many of them are resolved successfully thanks to my new networks."

Women-owned business provides clean water and sanitation products

A group of energetic elderly and illiterate women sell safe water and locally produced soap in water-scarce Kibera. The business fulfills a critical need – storage of clean and low-cost water – and provides steady revenue for the fourteen women who run it.

"Nya Nam Water Supply & Soap Detergents" is a small business owned by fourteen women in Kibera, Nairobi. With business training, coaching and loaning provided by Pamoja, their initiative turned into a steadily growing and stable business.

The group set up water tanks to supply clean water in the densely populated slum. Their liquid soap is more hygienic compared to the commonly used solid soap, as it reduces multiple contact by users. They operate hygienic public showers and toilets which provide safe alternatives in a community often attacked by contagious water-borne diseases. The business drives its revenue from a large untapped market with growing demands from the local community.

"I have a more stable income and I am finally a respected woman with self-confidence. I now mentor other women to empower them, as Pamoja empowered me."

THE BUSINESS IMPACT

Higher income

The business income increased by 30% in 2016. The women have higher household incomes.

Starting to save

All women started to make savings, most of them for the first time in their lives.

Better family relations

The business women report better relations to their husbands and more decision-making power at home.

Improved community health & hygiene

The local community has access to safe and affordable drinking water, clean showers and toilets.





























Building Effective Response for Peaceful Elections



Improving Community Safety and Cohesion



KEY FACTS

Theme: Electoral Violence Prevention Region: Migori County, Nairobi Period: July 2016 – Dec. 2017

Partner: Saferworld

Donor: UK Department for International

Development – DFID

CONTEXT

Violence around the general elections in August 2017 are almost inevitable. Migori county has often experienced electoral violence resulting in death, displacement and destruction of property. There is limited coordination between the police and civic peace actors for effective response to violence.

PROJECT AIM

Reduced potential for violence around the 2017 general election through strengthening local institutions, including the council of elders, local administrators, community and religious leaders.

Non-state actors report more cases of emerging community conflicts and authorities intervene effectively at early state.

ACTIVITIES 2016

- Community forums and town hall debates on electoral laws and procedures were organized, reaching 300 decision-makers
- Peace advocacy campaign through community radio talks reaching 350'000 people
- An early warning and response mechanism was established and is in use so that communities can report emerging community conflicts to authorities

ACHIEVEMENTS

- Community leaders are able to solve local level conflicts peacefully by themselves.
- Multi-stakeholder Early Warning and Early Response (EWER) team established for effective coordination and response.

KEY FACTS

Theme: Peace, Security & Stabilization

Region Kisumu

Period: Dec. 2016 – Dec. 2018

Partner: Act Change Transform (ACT!)

Donor: Danish International Development
Agency - DANIDA

CONTEXT

Kisumu county remains an epicenter of violence. Cattle rustling has led to sequential conflicts with fatalities and destruction of property compounded by land disputes. The county also suffers ethno-political violence and is home to major organized criminal groups.

PROJECT AIM

Improved community safety and security through enhancing communication and collaboration between state and non-state actors.

ACTIVITIES 2016

Community forums and coordination meetings were organized to strengthen collaboration between state and non-state actors in addressing youth at-risk, violent gang activities and extremism. The networking platforms were attended by a total of 140 representatives from the national and county government, the police, the Council of Elders, the media as well as religious, youth and civil society leaders.

ACHIEVEMENTS

- Improved levels of confidence and trust between civil society and state actors.
- Enhanced coordination for joint action between state actors and civil society organizations.

Promoting Vocational Skills & Small Businesses



KEY FACTS

Theme: Gender-based Violence Prevention

Region: Kilifi County, Coast

Period: July 2016 – December 2018
Partner: Coffey International Development
Donor: UK Department for International

Development - DFID

CONTEXT

Kilifi County is among the counties battling with increased Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG) due to increased alcohol, drug and substance abuse, commercial sex work and ill equipped police gender desks.

PROJECT AIM

Increased security and safety for women, men and children through strengthening coordination among community leaders, government actors, the police, schools and media practitioners.

ACTIVITIES 2016

- School and peer intervention: Safe spaces ("safety clubs") established in three schools to provide information to and peersupport among children
- Community mobilization and gender training:
 43 community leaders and community safety coordinators were trained and community learning platforms facilitated
- A media awareness campaign on gender issues was developed

ACHIEVEMENTS

- Community actors, schools, sex workers and police work more collaboratively together to address cases of gender-based violence.
- More cases of violence were reported to the police and handled successfully as a direct result of the training.

Theme: Economic development
Region: Western, Nairobi, coast region

Period: July 2016 – Dec. 2018

CONTEXT

In Kenya income inequality is deepening and hinders the development of a wide economic growth. Lowest-income women and youth lack access to knowledge, skills and financial services to grow their businesses to achieve economic self-sufficiency.

PROJECT AIM

Disadvantaged women and young people are enabled to grow their businesses, create income and jobs through business coaching, trainings, saving and peer-learning.

ACTIVITIES 2016

- 100 women and young people were trained in business and finance management, marketing as well as leadership and communication
- Business loans disbursed to 12 small enterprises. 95% of loan repayment on track as of 31st December 2016
- Mentoring, coaching, saving and peer-learning cycle are being implemented

ACHIEVEMENTS

- 80 women report improved household income
- 70 people started to make regular savings
- 90 women report more effective financial management within business and at home
- 80 women report better relationships with their husbands, reduced domestic violence and more self-confidence
- · 42 stable jobs were created.

School Improvement Loan & Leadership Training



Strengthening Community Child Care Services



KEY FACTS

Theme: Education for Rural Children,

Microfinance

Region: Migori, County, Western Kenya Period: April 2016 – March 2017 Partner: Kanyadgiro Primary School Donor: Kiwanis Club Liechtenstein

CONTEXT

480 children attend "Kanyadgiro Primary School", an accredited, rural school close to Lake Victoria. The school lacks funds to provide safe infrastructure. Staff and teachers lack knowledge and skills in child-centered teaching and school management. This affects the quality of education.

PROJECT AIM

Quality education through provision of safe facilities, trained staff and good school management practices. Children aged 13 – 15 have the knowledge to make informed career decisions.

ACTIVITIES 2016

- School improvement loan was granted and repaid
- · One class room was constructed
- Ten school teachers were trained in pedagogy, leadership and non-violent communication
- Two "business exposure days" for school children aged 15 were organized, visiting local companies

ACHIEVEMENTS

- School dropout rate reduced and attendance rates for teachers and students increased due to better reputation of the school
- Quality of education improved due to teacher trainings
- As a direct project result, local state authorities launched school facility investments

KEY FACTS

Theme: Community child care and education Region: Kibera in Nairobi and Likoni in Kwale Period: August 2016 – Dec. 2018

Partners: Local "Church of God Primary School", "Siblings Children's Center"

Donors: Frauenverein Vaduz, private donors

CONTEXT

Because of the HIV and AIDS epidemic, many children and adolescents live with chronically ill parents or are orphaned and exposed to health and developmental risks, violence, abuse and child labor.

PROJECT AIM

Provide child care support for exploited and disadvantaged children and families through strengthening community-owned care services.

ACTIVITIES 2016

- A community-run rescue and education center in Likoni is supported through feeding and family strengthening projects and infrastructure improvement.
- A day care center as well as an art and talent program is supported in Kibera, Nairobi

ACHIEVEMENTS

- 40 orphans and abused children in Likoni live in a safe environment, while maintaining relationships with their parents, where posible.
- The community and family support structure is strengthened through trainings, such as early childhood development
- An art and care program in Nairobi provides a safe and enabling environment for 20 children from Kibera slum on weekends.
